Mrs. Warrander Made Member of Fire Dept. Gets Gold Badge

IS SECOND WOMAN MEMBER OF THE DEPT.

Man Power Shortage Here Prompts Firemen To Make Decision

Mrs. Lee Warrander, of Beacon Hill, trained in first aid and known as a very careful auto driver, has been chosen by the Port Washington firemen as a driver of the Fire Department Ambulance, announces William H. Hewett, chairman of the Ambulance committee; this week. She has also been made a member of the Port Washington Fire department, the second local woman to be so honored.

"In World War I, the Fire Department did not have any regular fire alarm system," said Mr. Hewett, "and we had to rely on the good work of Mrs. Charles F. Lawrence to turn in the alarms and ring the old bell on the Atlantic Fire Hall on Carlton Avenue. Mrs. Lawrence, who resides next door to the Fire Hall, got the phone calls of fire, rushed to the Hall, pulled the bell rope and called out to the men as they arrived, the location of the fire. The Department, in appreciation of this good work, made Mrs. Lawrence an Honorary Deputy Fire Chief and gave her a gold badge."

"Now comes World War 2, and the firemen find themselves short of man power, with much greater responsibility and more equipment to handle, including the ambulance, which the Fire Department provides for Port Washington people. This Ambulance service requires much time on the part of the firemen, as a trip to a Hospital means that someone has to volunteer their time and the least time to reach any hospital and return runs over an hour. In addition to this the oxygen, resuscitator, and inhalator service have to be ready for any emergency at a moment's notice."

The boys of Troop 7 were active in supporting the recent bond rally, and were very successful in their efforts.



Florence Schmitt Holds Both Senior and Junior U. S. Crowns

Indianapolis Girl Who Held Crown for 4 Years: Won 3 National Titles Within 10 Days At Clementon Lake, New Jersey

Florence Schmitt, 12-year-old girl, and daughter of Mr. H. Schmitt, of 11 Essex New Salem, won the Women's National Long Distance Swimming championship at Clementon Lake, N. J., Saturday. She won the 220-yard freestyle title over the same last week and recently won the 220-yard free-style three titles were won in ten days. Miss Schmitt is the youngest girl to win both Senior and Junior titles in the same season, a feat equalled only twice in swimming history.

On the fourth lap Port Washington girl trailed Miss Hardin down the backstretch until she faltered and took third behind Katherine Breen, 15-year old former Junior Champion from the Firestone A. C. of Akron, Ohio. She swung wide and seemed doomed, but unleashed a sprint that put her ahead just after the swimmers hit the home stretch.

"So with the shortage of manpower caused by many of our members in the service or working in war plants the department finds itself up against a serious problem. Therefore the Ambulance committee studied the problem and sought a solution. After considerable consideration of the matter, the committee decided to seek women volunteers for the work of the Ambulance.

"The committee came to the conclusion that Mrs. Lee Warrender was the woman to fill the job, as she is trained in first aid work and is a careful driver. Mrs. Warrender told the committee that she would be very willing to help our firemen continue to give the public efficient ambulance service. The Fire Department has made Mrs. Warrender a member of the Department and has presented her with a gold badge for her office as Ambulance Driver. Thus Mrs. Warrender becomes the second woman to become a member of the Department. The Department feels very proud of the grateful act of Mrs. Warrender and has already received many letters of appreciation from patients testifying to her excellent service."
